

Ignatius of Antioch

Question:

Who is Ignatius of Antioch and what example does he offer us in Christian living as we celebrate his feast day on October 17th?

Answer:


As Bishop of Antioch (the modern day city of Antakya, Turkey), Ignatius witnessed to the faith during the reign of Emperor Trajan, who ruled from 98-117. Persecution of Christians broke out in Antioch, and Ignatius was captured and taken to Rome for martyrdom in the arena.

On his journey to Rome over land and sea, Ignatius writes seven letters to various churches. These letters give powerful glimpses into the theology and practice of the early church, along with insights into the role of a bishop as pastoral leader. Ignatius is the first to use the term "**Catholic Church**" to refer to the various Christian communities of the Roman Empire.

The best known of his letters is the one he wrote to the Romans. Ignatius addresses influential Christians who might be tempted to intercede on his behalf, thus sparing him from martyrdom. He advises them against it, being resolute in his desire to be the **"wheat of God."**

Eucharistic links are most evident in his words. As Christ willingly offered himself as witness to God's total love, Ignatius, too, desired to be **"food for the wild beasts,"** so that he could become **"the pure bread of Christ."** Eucharistic living was so crucial to Ignatius that he was willing to die in order to model himself on the Lord who willingly offered all.

A medida que cambian las estaciones, a muchos de nosotros nos gusta limpiar nuestras casas y deshacernos de alguna de la basura que hemos acumulado durante el verano. Un método de moda para ordenar es el método Marie Kondo, nombrado así por la autora que lo popularizó. Demasiado simplificado, es un proceso que lo obliga a revisar sus armarios, su garaje, su sótano, todos los lugares donde recolecta las temidas "**cosas.**" Mientras lo hace, levanta los artículos y se pregunta: "¿**Destella alegría**?"

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP Sparking Holiness

As the seasons change, a lot of us like to clean out our homes and unload some of the junk we've acquired over the summer. One trendy approach to decluttering is the Marie Kondo method, named after the author who popularized it. Overly simplified, it's a process that compels you to go through your closets, your garage, your basement — all the places you collect the dreaded **"stuff."** As you do so, you hold up the items and ask yourself: **"Does it spark joy?"**

It's a question that is bold in its simplicity. In answering, you're supposed to go with your gut. If it's a quick **"Yes, it sparks joy,"** the item should be kept. If the answer is no, it gets tossed.

There are people in life who will support our efforts to do God's will. There are those who will, as Paul says, "convince, reprimand, (and) encourage," unafraid of the reaction we give them. There are those who will shore up our defenses when the battle goes longer than we thought.
